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About this Guide

This guide provides a summary of expenditure for the Ministry of National Security (MNS) for the period 2016-2022. It provides Members of Parliament and stakeholders with an overview of the Ministry's responsibilities. Head 22: Ministry of National Security

Ministry Overview

Mission

To advance national development by creating a safer and more secure society through enhanced collaboration among all stakeholders, intelligence-based decision-making and strengthened inter-agency structures and systems.¹

Vision

To be at the pinnacle of public safety and security delivery.²

The Ministry of National Security is among the largest and most complex public sector organizations. The Ministry has primary responsibility for ensuring and maintaining security of the nation, people, territory and national interests. It is primarily responsible for the maintenance of law, order, public safety and defence against aggression, management of disaster preparedness and relief, monitoring and control of the flow of persons into and out of the country³.

In order to fulfill the diverse responsibilities that fall under the remit of the Ministry of National Security, there are ten (10) established Divisions:

General Administration

"General Administration or Head Office is responsible for ensuring that the other Divisions of the Ministry are provided with the necessary resources to achieve their objectives.⁴"

Immigration Division

The Immigration Division is responsible for the control of persons entering and leaving Trinidad and Tobago and the issue of travel documents both locally and at Trinidad and Tobago Missions overseas. The Immigration Division comprises approximately 500 members of staff who operate at offices throughout Trinidad and Tobago including national air and seaports.⁵"

The function of the Division is defined by the following Acts:

- Immigration Act
- Citizenship Act Chapter 1:50
- Former Constitution Order in Council 1962
- Immigration (Caribbean Community Skilled Nationals) Act 26/96

The Office of Disaster Preparedness and Management (ODPM)

The mission statement of the OPDM is to build national Disaster Risk Management and Climate Change Adaptation capabilities with partners and coordinate response and recovery operations in order to protect the people, environment and economy and ensure a disaster resilient nation.⁶"

Currently the primary piece of legislation governing disaster management in Trinidad and Tobago is the Disasters Measures Act Chapter 16:50 (Act 47 of 1978).

Several National Policies have been drafted for the disaster management system in Trinidad & Tobago including⁷:

- Crisis Communication, Guidelines and Response Plan
- National Earthquake Response Plan
- National Hurricane Response Plan
- Volunteer Policy

Trinidad and Tobago Police Service (TTPS)

The TTPS is charged with⁸:

- The Maintenance of Law and Order.
- Prevention and Detection of Crime
- Apprehension of Offenders.

The Police Service functions in accordance with the Police Service Act Chapter 15:01

Unlike other Divisions under the Ministry of National Security, the TTPS has its own expenditure Head in the Budget and therefore will not be addressed in this guide.

Life Guard Services

"The Lifeguard Service Division has the primary goal of ensuring the safety of individuals in aquatic environments. The personnel of this unit are highly skilled and trained professional swimmers.

This goal is approached through two main avenues. The first is by active protection on the nations beaches. The second, and probably more important, is through water safety training and education.⁹"

Probation Services Division

The Probation of Offenders Act of 1907 which brought about the birth of the Probation Service in Great Britain also provided for the establishment of a similar service here in the colonial territory.

Services Provided

- Supervision of Probationers
- Preparation of Reports which include Criminal Matters, Family Matters, Civil Matters and Domestic Violence Matters
- Community Service Supervision
- Bail Supervision
- Counselling Matrimonial Matters
- Family Sessions
- Walk-in Clients (not referred to by the Court.)

Programmes carried out by Probation Services Division

- Thinking for a Change Programme
- Remedial Therapy for Probationers¹⁰

Trinidad and Tobago Prison Service

The Trinidad and Tobago Prison Service is an arm of the criminal justice system and a division of the Ministry of National Security. It currently has in its employ just over three thousand officers and civilian workers, who perform a range of tasks related to the fulfillment of its mandate of holding and treating of incarcerated persons. The Prison Service is A unique entity, in that it is neither fully military, nor civilian in its operations as it straddles both spheres in the course of its operations.¹¹"

The Prison Service functions in accordance with the:

- Prisons Act, 13.01

Trinidad and Tobago Fire Service (TTFS)

"The Trinidad and Tobago Fire Service operates under the Fire Service Act Chapter 35:50 of the Laws of Trinidad and Tobago. 12"

Trinidad and Tobago Defence Force (TTDF)

The Trinidad and Tobago Defence Force was established in 1962 under the Defence Force Act 14:01 and was given the following responsibilities: To defend the sovereign good of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago, to cooperate with and assist the civil power in maintaining law and order, to assist the civil authorities in times of crisis or disaster, to perform ceremonial functions on behalf of the State and to provide search and rescue services in keeping with national requirements and under international agreements (assist in the prevention of trafficking of narcotics and other illegal goods, monitor the safety of shipping waters and assist the development of the national community).

The following Specialised Youth Service Programmes fall under the remit of the TTDF¹³:

• Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC)

The Trinidad and Tobago Civilian Conservation Corps is a nationwide programme, with the mission to "positively alter attitudes and behaviours of socially marginalized young citizens of Trinidad and Tobago".¹⁴

• Military-led Academic Training (MILAT)

MiLAT provides a Safe, Structured and Regulated setting within which at-risk young men interact with Trinidad and Tobago Defence Force personnel and non-military professionals, benefit from positive mentorship and reinforcement, and receive assistance rebuilding their ambitions, hopes and dreams. MiLAT's ultimate goal is to help cadets to develop a

positive character, learn and enhance their vocational and para-military training skills, attain their academic certification in an alternative environment in order to improve their chances of attaining a better quality of life.¹⁵

Trinidad and Tobago Cadet Force

"The Trinidad and Tobago Cadet Force is a Voluntary Youth Organisation that acquires its membership from secondary schools. The main objective of the Cadet Force is to train and inspire young men and women to be model citizens. Emphasis is placed on instilling in the Cadet qualities such as discipline, loyalty and duty.¹⁶"

3.32 The Reconciliation of Monthly Abstract of Payments and Unpaid Cheques received at the Auditor General's Department was a photocopied document and did not bear original signatures. In addition, it was not signed by the Accounting Officer nor was evidence seen that it was checked by Internal Audit. This was not in accordance with Comptroller of Accounts directives.

3.33 A Statement of Reconciliation of Monthly Abstract of Payments and Unpaid Cheques was not signed by the Accounting Officer nor was evidence seen that it was checked by Internal Audit. This was not in accordance with Comptroller of Accounts directives.

Balances held for more than three (3) years pg. 138

4.30 The Accounting Officer should comply with Financial Instructions paragraphs

213 (1) and (2) which states: 213 (1) "Unless the Treasury otherwise directs, all deposits which have remained unclaimed for three years shall be transferred to revenue."

213 (2) "Where an amount is allowed to remain on deposit for more than three years, the authority for retaining it on deposit must be stated on each subsequent analysis statement and the Treasury may, on written application by the claimant, refund any deposit transferred to revenue."

4.33 An amount of \$6,997,299.10 was held in three (3) deposit accounts for a period greater than three (3) years as detailed below:

Public Sector Investment Programme 2021 Achievements¹⁹

Public Safety and Citizen Security

Public safety and citizen security are of crucial concern to the citizenry of Trinidad and Tobago and continues to be a priority of Government. Fostering safety and security requires focus on crime detection and prevention, border security, cyber security, terrorism defence, intelligence gathering and disaster risk reduction to name a few. As such, in fiscal 2021, the Ministry of National Security continued to focus on:

- improving border security;
- enhancing the criminal justice system;
- supporting humanitarian assistance and disaster support and relief efforts;
- improving physical infrastructure and providing the necessary specialised equipment for the military; and
- providing support to the Government's response to managing the COVID-19 pandemic.

Protecting our Nation's Borders - Maritime Formation

The overall focus of the Ministry of National Security therefore is to ensure that security forces are equipped and mobile to respond to any challenges to the nation's borders.

The Trinidad and Tobago Coast Guard (TTCG) has the responsibility of safety and security within the maritime borders of Trinidad and Tobago. In fiscal 2021, the TTCG expended the sum of \$17.5 million for the acquisition and maintenance of naval assets as well as the improvement and development of the infrastructure and utilities at the bases which support the operationalisation of the TTCG and the vessels.

The naval fleet was enhanced by the acquisition of two (2) Naval Cape Class Patrol Vessels which were launched in July 2021. The vessels will assist the TTCG in patrolling the nation's borders. Additionally, the TTCG has commenced procurement for the acquisition of four (4) high speed outboard interceptor vessels at a cost of \$11.0 million to further enhance the fleet. These interceptor are able to operate closer to shore as well as work alongside the larger naval crafts to increase the efficiency in monitoring and policing our territorial waters.

In order to support these newly acquired vessels and the existing fleet, the TTCG has upgraded the electrical system, potable water system, waste water treatment system and air conditioning systems at Staubles Bay.

Additionally, the TTCG commenced the development of preliminary designs for an Integrated Logistics Support Facility at the Heliport Base in Chaguaramas at a cost of \$1.5 million. The facility will be a centralised service and maintenance facility for the TTCG.

Strengthening our Military Capability

The Trinidad and Tobago Regiment (TTR) focused on operational readiness and the improvement and maintenance of its existing infrastructure and equipment. An investment totalling \$38.5 million was allocated to the TTR, of which, \$17.7 million was utilised for the implementation of priority projects.

The TTR sought to increase the capacity and capability of the Engineering Battalion to respond to disasters by commencing the procurement of vehicles and equipment necessary to support its work. The TTR was provided with the sum of \$2.0 million to procure an excavator, a flatbed truck and a trailer.

Infrastructural works at the La Romain Base of the TTR advanced to ninety-five (95) percent completion in fiscal 2021. The TTR utilised the sum of \$11.5 million for the provision of preengineered structures, construction of roads and installation of utilities. The Second Infantry Battalion which is based at the Heliport Base in Chaguaramas will be relocated to the La Romain Base pending completion of the infrastructural works.

The main workshop at Camp Cumuto is being refurbished to increase the operational capacity of the facility and reduce the cost of vehicle maintenance and repairs. The tendering process was completed and a contractor was engaged. The sum of \$2.3 million was expended to initiate these works which commenced in April 2021. However, work was halted in May 2021 with the implementation of Government's COVID-19 restrictions. The refurbishment has resumed and are expected to continue into fiscal year 2022.

Ensuring Aviation Security

The Trinidad and Tobago Air Guard (TTAG) is the agency responsible for providing aviation security to safeguard citizens, national resources and economic interests within national borders.

The TTAG, as well as other arms of the TTDF, provided support during the pandemic to the Ministry of Health by providing assistance in the transportation of COVID-19 positive patients.

The TTAG was allocated the sum \$2.0 million to continue the procurement process for the acquisition of the required vehicles.

Building our Fire Fighting Capability

The Trinidad and Tobago Fire Service (TTFS) is responsible for fire and civil defence through the provision of fire and emergency response services to the nation. The TTFS has focused its development programme on:

- the upgrade of existing fire stations;
- the construction of new stations to serve new residential and commercial communities; and
- the acquisition of vehicles and equipment to ensure that each station has a first response appliance and an ambulance.

The TTFS has embarked on a programme to construct/reconstruct seventeen (17) stations across Trinidad and Tobago especially in rural and newly developing areas. The Mayaro, Penal and Roxborough Fire Stations have been completed and are operational.

The TTFS also entered into a design-build-equip arrangement for the construction of the Pont Fortin Fire Station which is estimated to cost \$39 million. In fiscal 2021, the sum of \$10.2 million was expended for the construction of the station which is 5 percent completed. The upgrade of the Scarborough Fire Station advanced to 60 percent completion with expenditure of \$0.3 million. The major achievements included roof works, electrical works and construction of the decking.

In addition, the TTFS sought to refurbish and recommission two (2) crash tenders in order to ensure optimal levels of firefighting capabilities. Of the \$2.0 million allocated for the project, a total of \$0.2 million was expended to extend the functionality of the tenders.

Rehabilitation of Offenders

The Trinidad and Tobago Prison Service (TTPrS) is an arm of the criminal justice system and a division of the Ministry of National Security. The Prison Service is committed to the protection of society and crime prevention by facilitating opportunities for habitation/rehabilitation of offenders while maintaining control under safe, secure and humane conditions. In fiscal 2021, the TTPrS expended a total of \$23.7 million for the following activities related to the fulfilment of its mandate of holding and treating of incarcerated persons:

- installation of an alarm system at the Maximum Security Prison (MSP) which has advanced to forty (40) percent completion;
- design and installation of a CCTV system at the MSP which is 95 percent completed at a cost of \$0.7 million;
- upgrade of plumbing and electrical systems at the Remand Yard Prison which is 45 percent completed with expenditure in the sum of \$22.4 million; and
- establishment of a Community Residence/Rehabilitation Centre to accommodate female child offenders which advanced to 25 percent completion.

Consideration of Proposals for the Supplementation and Variation of Appropriation for the fiscal year 2021²⁰

During fiscal 2021, it was necessary to have a Supplementation of Appropriation of resources to fund urgent and critical Recurrent and Capital Expenditure to September 30, 2021 in areas where insufficient or no allocation was provided. The source of these additional funds was the Consolidated Fund.

The budget allocation of \$3,128,652,000.00²⁴ for the Ministry of National Security is comprised of:

- The Draft Estimates of Recurrent Expenditure in the sum of \$2,953,450,000;
- The Draft Estimates of Development Programme in the sum of \$175,202,000.00
 - Consolidated Fund in the sum of \$103,184,000.00; and
 - o Infrastructure Development Fund²⁵ of the sum \$72,018,000.00.

The Estimates of Recurrent Expenditure include:

- 01 Personnel Expenditure \$2,097,340,680.00;
- 02 Goods and Services \$441,575,830.00;
- 03 Minor Equipment Purchases **\$15,534,360.00**; and
- 04 Current Transfers and Subsidies \$398,999,130.00.

The Ministry of National Security's:

- Total allocation as a percentage of National Budget = 5.3%
- Recurrent Expenditure as a percentage of the total Recurrent Expenditure budget is = 5.3%

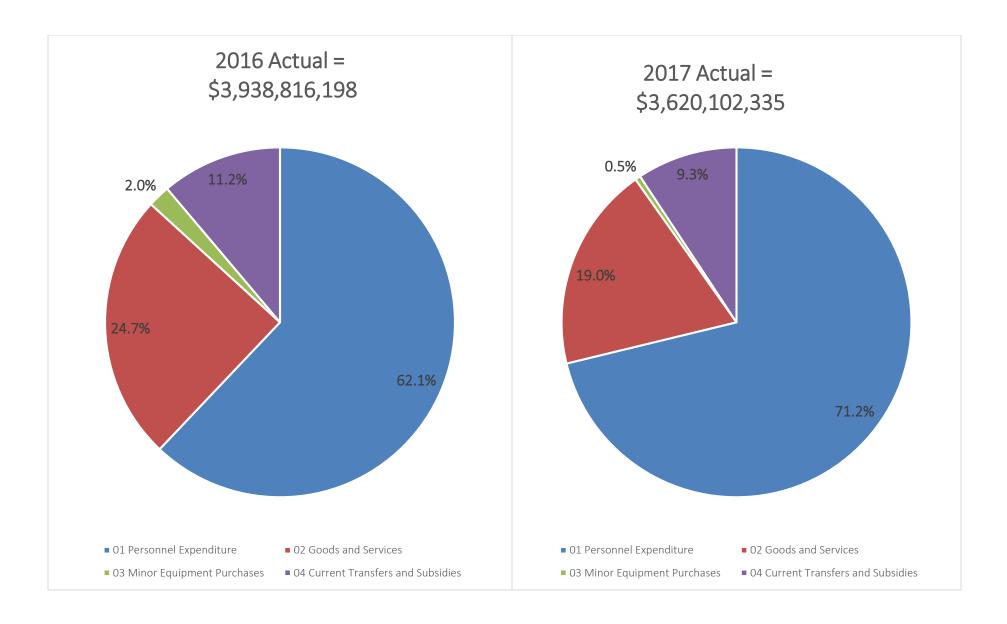
Summary of Recurrent Expenditure for the period 2016-2022

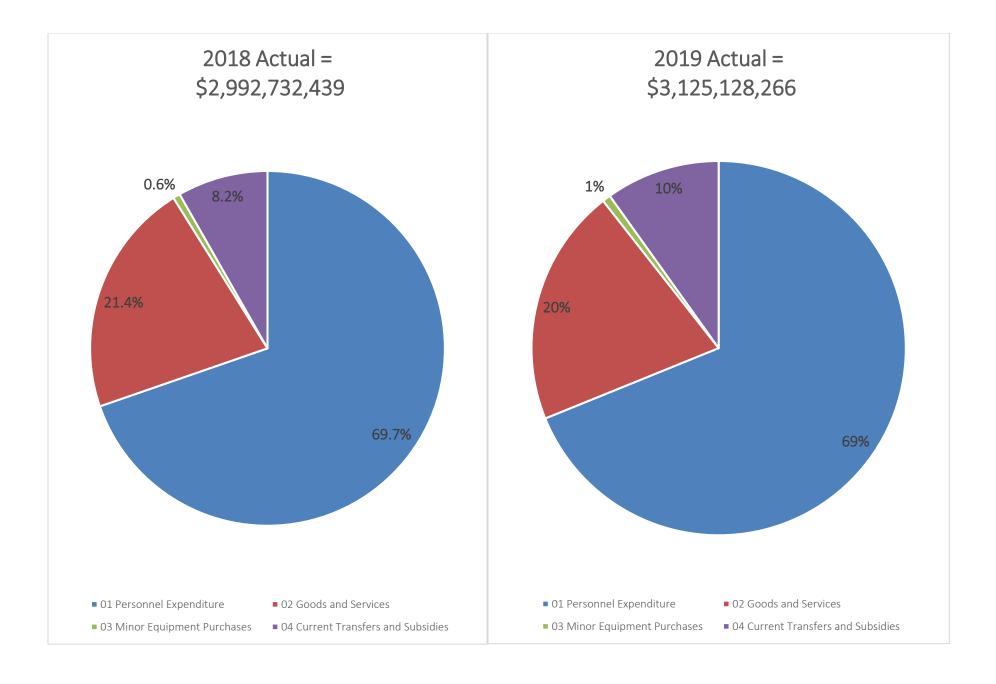


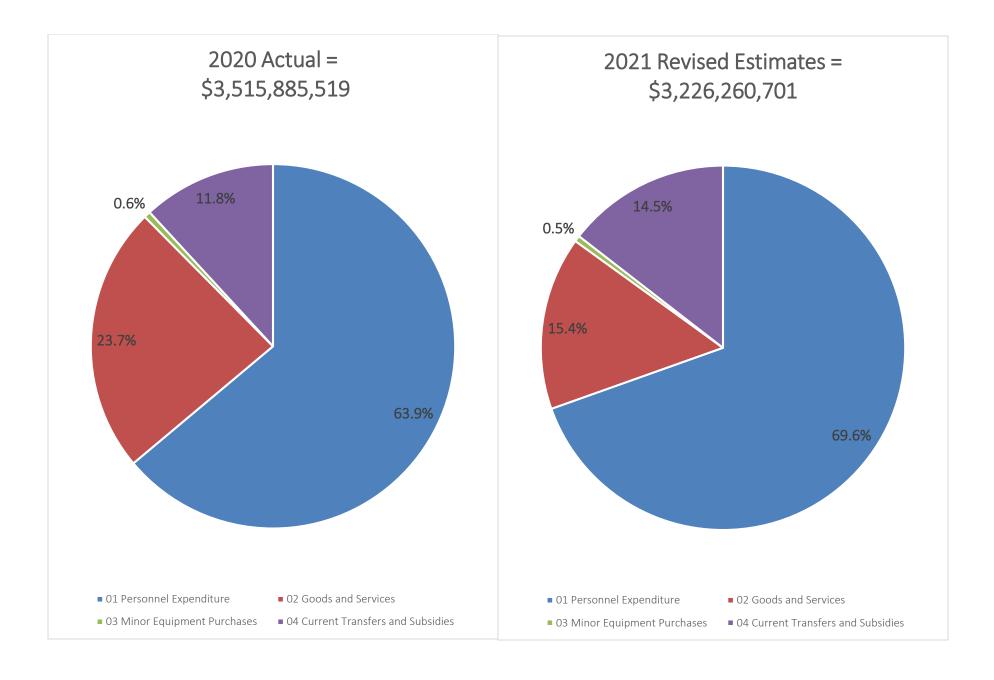
Analysis of Recurrent Expenditure

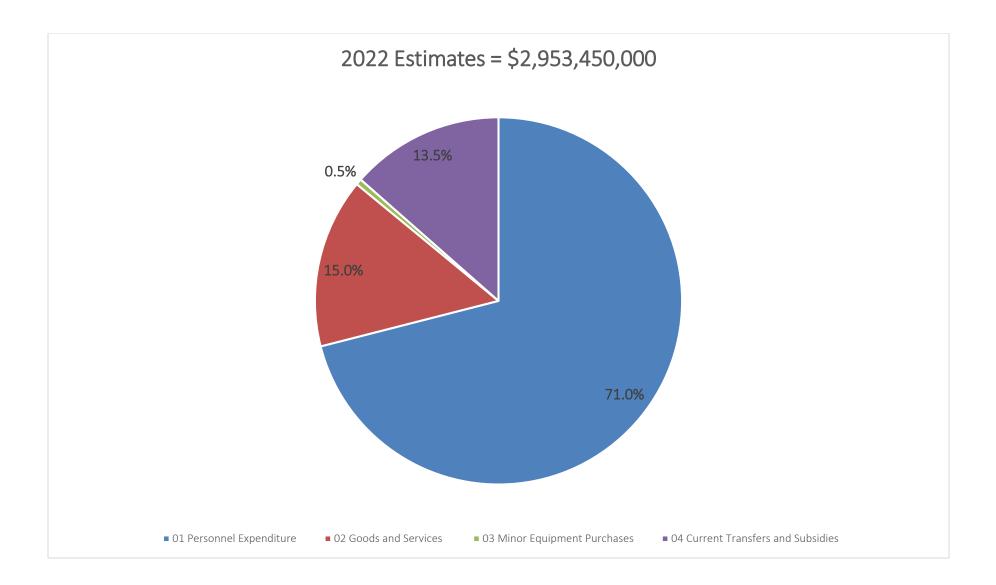
Recurrent Expenditure refers to the payments for expenses which are incurred during the day-to-day operations of the Ministry for Personnel Expenditure, Goods and Services, Minor Equipment Purchases and Current Transfers and Subsidies. Estimated Recurrent Expenditure for Fiscal Year 2021/2022 is \$2,953,450,000.00.

- The Revised Estimate of Recurrent Expenditure for Fiscal Year 2020/2021 was \$3,226,260,701.00. Therefore, in Fiscal Year 2021/2022, there is a decrease in allocation of (\$390,757,253) or (12.50%).
- The largest portion of the allocation has consistently gone to Sub-Head 01 Personnel Expenditure. This allocation accounts for approximately 71% of total funding for the Ministry for Fiscal Year 2021/2022 with the Ministry receiving \$2,097,340,680.00 for its day to day operations.
- Minor Equipment Purchases has consistently received the lowest portion of the total allocation for the Ministry over the period 2018 to 2022. This allocation accounts for approximately 0.5% of total funding for the Ministry for Fiscal Year 2021/2022.
- Goods and Services received approximately 15% of the allocation for 2021/2022 fiscal year (\$441,575,830).



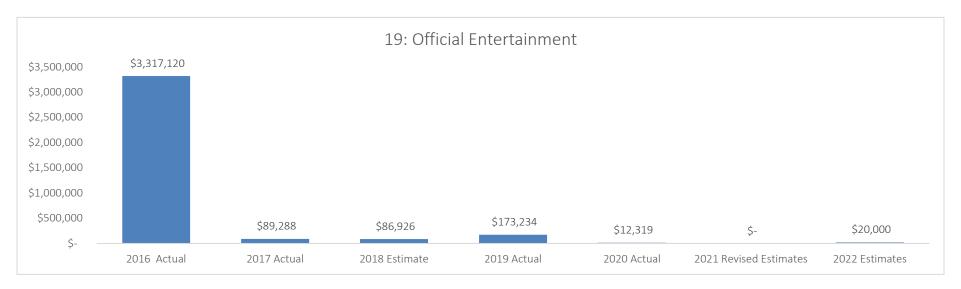






Analysis of Recurrent Expenditure Unique to the Ministry of National Security

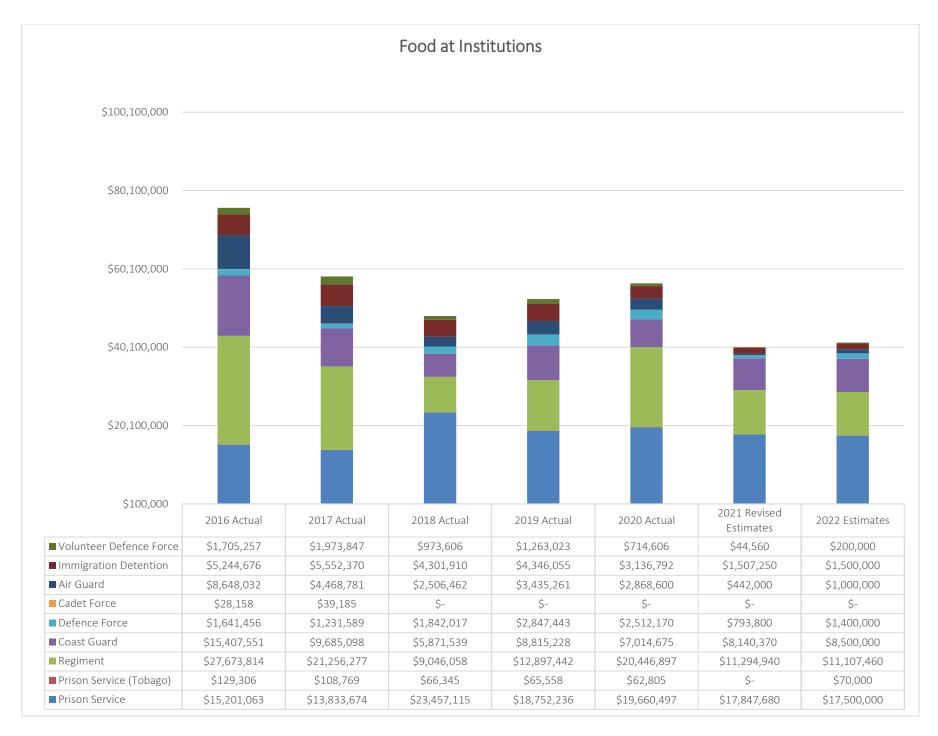
Unique Expenditure refers to expenditure items incurred by the Ministry of National Security that may not feature in other Ministries or Departments.



*Official Entertainment - Provision of official entertainment for holders of certain Public Offices within the purview of the Salaries Review Commission. These include:

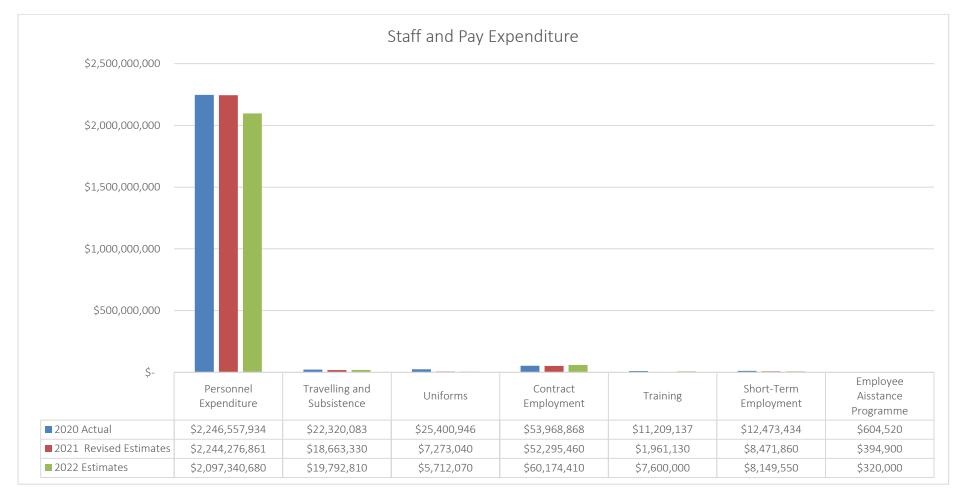
- Auditor General

Staff and Pay (Excluding Direct Charges²⁷)

The allocation of staff expenditure for the fiscal year **2021/2022** was **\$2,199,089,520** which represents a **decrease** of approximately **5.7**% from the last fiscal year **2020/2021**. The following chart provides a breakdown of all expenditure related to staff from 2020-2022.



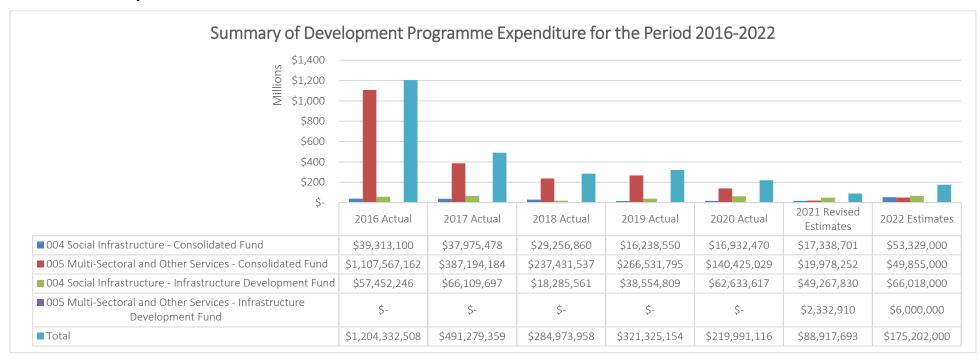

Summary of Development Programme Expenditure for the period 2016-202228

Development Programme is capital expenditure aimed at improving and enhancing development in different areas of Trinidad and Tobago which includes; human resources, economic and social development.

The allocation to the Ministry of National Security for development programmes and projects for fiscal year 2021/2022 = \$175,202,000.00. These funds are presented in two parts as follows:

- Funds disbursed directly from the Consolidated Fund = \$103,184,000.00 and represent (59%) of the total allocation to the Ministry; and
- Funds disbursed from the Infrastructure Development Fund = \$72,018,000.00 and represent (41%) of the total allocation to the Ministry.

Public Sector Investment Programme 2022 Projections²⁹

The Public Sector Investment Programme (PSIP), which represents the capital expenditure component of the National Budget, is the instrument used by Government to effect its vision and policies. It is a budgeting and strategic planning tool made up of projects and programmes, designed to realise the goals set out in the Government's overarching policy.

The PSIP budget document provides a detailed description of the programmes and projects and includes a review of the implementation of projects and programmes in the previous financial year and highlights the major projects and programmes to be implemented in the upcoming financial year.

- The Public Sector Investment Programme is intended to achieve:
 - the country's social and economic development goals; and
 - enhance the quality of life of all citizens.

Public Safety and Citizens Security

Public safety and citizen security in Trinidad and Tobago continue to be priority areas and key agenda items among Government's policies, since the proliferation of crime and criminality serves to impede the path towards sustainable development of the country. Given the multifaceted nature crime and criminality, Government has adopted a holistic and inter-agency approach across the various national security arms to foster public safety and security. Emphasis is being placed on strengthening the country's capacity to protect the nation's borders from illegal trafficking in its various forms as well as enhancing the coordination and cooperation among agencies.

Another aspect of the country's national security strategy is the reform of the prison system to focus of rehabilitation of offenders in keeping restorative justice principles, such that inmates could be reintegrated into society and contribute to national development. In addition, fire-fighting capabilities will be enhanced in order to prevent the loss of lives and property through fires. In order to achieve these goals, in fiscal 2022 national security agencies will place emphasis on the acquisition of the requisite tools and equipment as well as the maintenance and upgrading of physical infrastructure and facilities throughout Trinidad and Tobago

Key Points

In fiscal 2022, the focus of the national security agencies will continue to:

- i. Enhance border security;
- ii. Strengthen military capability;
- iii. Ensuring aviation security;
- iv. Improve fire- fighting capability;
- v. Prisoner rehabilitation and upgrading of prisoners' facilities.
