BACKGROUND

- 1. The Bail (Amendment) (No.2) Bill, 2019¹ (hereinafter referred to as "the Bill") seeks to amend the Bail Act Chap. 4:60² (hereinafter referred to as "the Act") to provide for the circumstances in which bail may be denied to a person who is charged with a listed offence that is punishable for a term of imprisonment of ten years or more.
- 2. The **Bail (Amendment) (No.2) Bill** was introduced in the Senate by the Attorney General and Minister of Legal Affairs on October 23, 2019.
- 3. The Bill is inconsistent with **Sections 4** and **5** of the **Constitution of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago** and would therefore be required to be passed by a special majority of three-fifths of the members of each House.

KEY FEATURES OF THE BILL

Eligibility for Bail

- 4. Clause 3 of the Bill would provide for the inclusion of the offences of possession of firearm or prohibited weapon for the purpose of trafficking under section 9A of the Firearms Act, Chap. 16:01 and possession of a prohibited weapon, as offences for which a person would be denied access to bail for a period of one hundred and twenty (120) days under the Bail Act, Chap. 4:06.
- 5. **Clause 3** of the Bill also seeks to include a new subsection 3(A) into the **Section 5** of the **Bail Act**, to define a prohibited weapon as artillery, automatic firearm, grenade, bomb or other like missile.
